## Small Classes, Big Results

Why does this collaborative approach flourish at Williston? Because our faculty bring wide-ranging life experiences and enthusiasm to the classroom. Because outside the classroom, teachers also interact with students as advisors, coaches, and dorm parents. And because our classes average just 12 students.

#### **WE THE STUDENTS**

After studying The Thirteen American Arguments: Enduring Debates That Define and Inspire Our Country, by Howard Fineman, students in AP U.S. Government and Politics put their knowledge to the test in the "We the People" civics competition. Williston teams have placed in the top three in the state all but three years since 1998.

#### THE WRITER'S LIFE

Williston's annual Writers' Workshop brings some of the country's most respected authors—Richard Russo, Jodi Picoult, and David Maraniss, to name just a few—to campus for a public reading and a workshop with the advanced writing class. In 2014, Williston alumna and author Jennifer duBois '02 returned to the school to discuss her book *Cartwheel*.

#### **READ ALL ABOUT IT**

Students taking the Journalism elective are part of a storied legacy: The school's newspaper, *The Willistonian*, is the oldest continuously published high school newspaper in the country.

#### SONG OF HERSELF

Les élèves in AP French explore the theme of la quête de soi (the quest for self) by examining the difficult life and celebrated music of Edith Piaf, drawing on her and Charles Trenet's book La France Des Années 40 En Chansons, as well as the acclaimed film La Vie en Rose.

#### GAME ON!

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Drawing on ideas in *The Game Maker's Apprentice* by Jacob Habgood and Mark Overmars, students in Video Game Programming & Design learn to code by creating video games, eventually developing their own "mods" (that's programmer-talk for modifications).

#### DRAWING OUT DISCUSSION

Marjane Satrapi's graphic autobiography Persepolis: The Story of a Childhood transports the entire 10th-grade class to Iran to experience the Islamic Revolution and its aftermath. Acclaimed and provocative, the book always sparks discussions of issues still shaping the world.

#### THE HEIGHTS OF DRAMA

To help students prepare for their performance of Lin-Manuel Miranda's Tony Award-winning musical *In the Heights*, director Emily Ditkovski led the cast on a field trip to the Manhattan neighborhood where the show is set to meet with actors from the Broadway production.



Williston's competitive drive isn't limited to the athletic fields. The school's robotics team develops and programs its mechanical athletes (with names like Will-E) for competitions around the state and beyond.

Share class notes in a virtual notebook and get comments from classmates and teachers.

Create a digital portfolio of all their school work, then take it with them, via the cloud, to college.


Design a monument to commemorate a historic figure or event using 3-D modeling software, then print it on a 3-D printer.



### We Are All Connected

In the 21st century, preparing for success in college and beyond means learning how to take full advantage of available technology. Our Curricular Technology Program (CTP) teaches students how to use technology thoughtfully to communicate, problem-solve, learn remotely, and think critically. With a Microsoft Surface as the centerpiece, the CTP also encompasses software, such as the note-taking program OneNote; Veracross, the school's learning management system; training and support; and a campuswide Wi-Fi network that makes everything hum.





"Having this device in every faculty member's hand and every student's hand creates opportunities to take our inquiries deeper," says Math Department Head Joshua Seamon, who uses his Surface to record and share his lectures, so that his students spend less time scribbling notes and more time engaging with the material.





# Guided by COMPASS

Williston's Comprehensive Program for Academic and Social Success—COMPASS—is an innovative, 360-degree framework that deeply engages students and prepares them for college and later life. Through four signature elements (described on the following pages), the program creates a rich academic and social environment in which students acquire the tools they need to excel. # Do Your Own Thing

The Williston Scholars independent study program allows students to conceive and develop their own trimester-long research or arts projects. Working closely with leading members of the faculty and resources from the nearby Five Colleges, students engage in deep, self-directed learning culminating in a report and final presentation to the school community.





#### **PURSUING A PASSION**

What Williston Scholars choose to explore is as varied as their personal interests and artistic talents. One recent cohort of scholars built a nine-foot water barometer, studied the Lisbon earthquake, and examined the birth of Romanticism. Even though topics must fall within academic subject areas, students continue to find surprising new areas to explore. A sampling:

**MATH:** Kohmei Kadoya '19, Peter Seo '20, and Jack Long '20 coded and built a working robotic arm and hand.

**PERFORMING ARTS:** Maddie Elsea '19 directed and acted in an original interpretation of Sarah Ruhl's *Eurydice*.

**SCIENCE:** Trevor Corsello '20 launched a high-altitude weather balloon that rose to 95,000 feet.

**HISTORY:** Robby Hill '19 explored historical issues around felon disenfranchisement in Alabama.

VISUAL ARTS: Keyu Lu '20 created a series of mixed-media political graffiti as part of her explorations of the historical and sociological value of that art form.

**LANGUAGE:** Sophie Little '19 researched and presented the history of French New Wave Cinema in French.

**ENGLISH:** DJ Poulin '19 wrote an original collection of short stories, all of which take place on the same night.

# Preparing for College

Williston's college counseling process is highly personalized. Students meet frequently with their counselors to talk about goals, values, ideals, and interests. Classroom sessions and workshops provide students and families with key information at the appropriate time. Counselors offer valuable insights into the college admission process, but they also foster self-awareness and independent thinking so students can effectively determine which colleges are uniquely suited to them.

#### FINDING YOUR IDEAL SCHOOL

Williston provides a six-point college counseling support program.

- 1. College fairs.
  Meet with admission officers from roughly 75 schools that visit Williston each fall.
- 2. Expert panels.
  Get questions
  answered by college

  Weekend.
- **3. Mock interviews.** Practice with visiting college admission deans.
- 4. Athletic guidance.
  A customized strategy helps you navigate the

recruiting process.

- **5. Peer insights.** Hear from recent Williston grads about their college experience and what worked for them.
- 6. Step-bystep help.
  A dedicated junior year course fully prepares you for the application process.

#### ACADEMIC STRATEGIES TUTORIAL

Students electing to join this skill-building class meet regularly with learning specialists in small groups to receive specific, targeted instruction in notetaking, study habits, and organizational strategies.

#### LABORATORY FOR ACADEMIC SUCCESS (LAS)

Every evening during regular study hours, LAS faculty supervise and support small groups of students as they complete their homework. The low teacher-student ratio allows every student to get customized attention and assistance.

#### WRITING, MATH, AND SCIENCE CENTERS

These three drop-in centers in the library offer one-on-one support to help students with assignments, long-term projects, or exam prep. Staffed by teachers and peer tutors, the centers are open during the class day and evening study hours. A testament to how great they are? Students log more than 1,500 visits each year.

#### PEER TUTORING

For general academic help, Williston created Areté, a peer-tutoring organization (the name is Greek for excellence). Juniors and seniors in high academic standing are invited to be tutors. They are then matched with peers looking for extra academic support in the tutors' areas of strength.

### Help for Every Student

Williston's Center for Academic Success is a constellation of services that provides students at every level with the resources, instruction, and academic assistance they need to succeed. We offer levels of support for every kind of learner, ranging from drop-in consultations at our writing, math, and science centers to the more structured offerings of the Academic Strategies Tutorial and Laboratory for Academic Success. Because confident students achieve great things.





# Life Skills are CORE Here

Williston's CORE Life and Leadership
Program is a scaffolded, four-year
curriculum that introduces students to
important life skills through the use of
developmentally appropriate themes
(Be Curious, Look Outward, Embrace
Responsibility, Seek Excellence). Tailored
to each grade, the program helps students
develop organization, self-awareness,
character, judgment, and leadership,
through class assemblies, conversations in
advisories, dedicated classroom sessions,
and all-school discussions.





#### FOUR YEARS OF CORE

Each year of CORE introduces students to themes and life skills that directly relate to their personal and social concerns.

#### **9TH: BE CURIOUS**

Ninth graders focus on the importance of curiosity and establishing a foundation of values based on organization, reflection, and empathy.

#### 10TH: LOOK OUTWARD

Tenth graders explore identity in the context of the community and the world, and examine issues around decision-making as they gain more independence and responsibility.

#### 11TH: EMBRACE RESPONSIBILITY

In eleventh grade, students work on finding their voice and taking ownership of their future through the college application process and other leadership roles.

#### 12TH: SEEK EXCELLENCE

In their senior year, students focus on honing leadership skills in their community and developing a personal legacy that will live on at Williston—and accompany them into the world.

### Our Advisory Program

Advisors at Williston are like your own personal support network—there when you need them to help you set goals, tackle challenges, and celebrate successes (often with brownies!). Each week, advisors meet with students individually and in small groups. And at regular Advisory Dinners, students relax and have fun together over a casual meal at a local restaurant or at the advisor's home.

#### FOUR KEYS TO A SUCCESSFUL ADVISORY PROGRAM

To prepare students for the challenges of secondary school, Williston offers a comprehensive program of social support and academic quidance.

- 1. We start with our C.O.R.E. Program for Ninth Graders (see page 32), which uses introductory workshops, group activities, and one-on-one guidance to ease students' transition.
- 2. Students in grades 10 through 12 have mixed-grade advisories. Advisors meet with students individually and in advisee groups of six each week to discuss goals, explain courses, help with time management, and offer counsel on any other issues of concern.
- 3. At regular Advisory Dinners, group members share a casual meal at a local restaurant or at the advisor's home to further build on their relationships.
- 4. Advisors keep parents up to date through email and Skype, and encourage parents to check in as needed.






# Let There Be Music (and Dance!)

Our primary synthetic turf field is used for football, soccer, lacrosse, and field hockey. The lights allow for showcase evening games before crowds of cheering Wildcats.



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
#### WHAT'S THERE TO DO AROUND HERE?


Food and conversation naturally bring people together. At Birch Dining Commons, students, faculty, and staff members exchange ideas and relax over good food in a sun-filled hall that looks out on the school pond. Tables of varying sizes make it possible for a whole team to gather, or for two friends to have a private chat. The menu accommodates all tastes—vegetarian or carnivore, adventurous or traditional—with offerings that are both healthy and delicious.



#### SAVE ROOM FOR FUN

Special events call for special foods. Williston's many outdoor gatherings feature barbecue and picnic fare. The dining commons mixes things up with Willy World international dinners, where on Africa Night, we served up stewed chicken, plantains, and, for dessert, Nigerian puff puff.





Each of Williston's seven single-gender dorms has its own feeling, from the charm of Memorial Hall to the comforts of John Wright to the Victorian-goesgreen vibe of the trio of dorms that frame our new residential quad (see page 66). On-site dorm parents lead a residential program that helps students adjust to dorm life and develop good study habits. Having roommates delivers built-in friends for life.

#### A SAMPLING OF WILLISTON DORMS



Emily McFadon Vincent House is the third and newest of the Residential Quad's sibling dorms, completed in 2020. Home to 40 10th-, 11th-, and 12th-grade girls, it is the first building named for an alumna of the Northampton School for Girls.

John Hazen White House, completed in 2018 and now housing 40 9th- and 10th-grade boys, is modeled on 194 Main Street, with the same green features and contemporary floor plan, and a deep front porch where students and faculty gather.

194 Main Street, built in 2008 on what is now the residential quad, houses 9th- and 10th-grade girls in a restored 1880 Victorian connected to two modern buildings featuring geothermal heating and cooling and built to LEED energy standards.



Memorial Hall, divided into Mem East for girls and Mem West for boys, houses 36 students (and three faculty families) in each wing. Located on the Main Quad, its front yard is a popular hangout spot on spring evenings.

John Wright House, with its spacious common room and popular pool table, is home to 10th-, 11th-, and 12th-grade boys. Set beside the chapel, it's on the new Residential




ford Hall, our largest boys' dorm, houses 52 10th-, 11th-, and 12th-graders (and five faculty families) in a historic building on the Main Quad, making it convenient to the library, Campus Center, and Birch Dining Commons.

### FIVE FUN THINGS YOU'LL LOVE ABOUT DORM LIFE AT WILLISTON

- 1. An instant social life, with studymates, classmates, and teammates. Imagine living in a house with a bunch of your best friends. Our boarders often describe their dormmates as being their support network.
- 2. Amazing dorm parents who plan fun events and mentor you. Williston's dorm parents help guide you with decisions, involve you in dorm traditions, and are there to listen when you need to talk.
- 3. Common spaces to hang out in. Comfy couches, mini kitchens, pool tables—our dorms are designed around places to chill and study with your friends.
- **4.** A crash course in life skills. As one senior put it, "Living what is essentially a college lifestyle has made me more responsible

and reliable."

**5. Friends for life.** There's an undeniable bond that grows among people who live and work together. It's a connection that many of our alumni say never goes away.







# Our New Quad

#### A SECOND CAMPUS CENTER

Located across Park Street from the

#### **UNCOMMON COMMON ROOMS**

Each of the quad's new dorms has an atrium-like common room set in the building's center, surrounded by student rooms. Common rooms are large enough to hold all of the dorm's residents for meetings or special events, and the arrangement of comfortable couches and sitting areas allows for a mix of everyday uses: Students can be working on homework while others are playing a video game or discussing an assignment.

#### **SMALL THINGS THAT ADD UP**

Design features in each of the dorms reflect the school's deep understanding of what boarding students (and faculty) need to make residential life memorable. A shared door and entrance hallway join the student and faculty housing, for example, simplifying pizza deliveries. The large basements are outfitted with game rooms complete with pool tables, foosball, and Ping-Pong, so students can unwind or take a quick study break. And while faculty living areas are physically separate from the main living space, the two are connected by an office that provides convenient access and easy interaction between students and dorm parents.

#### **GREEN IN MORE WAYS THAN ONE!**

Williston's newly completed Residential Quad includes three state-ofthe-art energy-efficient dorms—Emily McFadon Vincent House, John Hazen White House. and 194 Main Street surrounding a grassy courtyard. That inviting central green space serves as a popular socializing spot for boarding students, while some 350 feet underground, a network of geothermal wells uses the earth's constant 58-degree temperature to keep the dorms warm in winter and cool in summer—no fossil fuels required.




