NORTHAMPTON SCHOOL FOR GIRLS TURNS 100

A LASTING LEGACY REMEMBERED

Williston Northampton School is thrilled to host the 100th anniversary celebration for the Northampton School for Girls, and members of Williston Northampton's Advancement team have been hard at work putting together an action-packed schedule that will help alumnae reminisce about the past while celebrating everything they and their alma mater have accomplished in that time.

"The legacy of the Northampton School for Girls lives on in myriad ways today, and this is a special opportunity to highlight how vital a role that NSFG has played in our school's development."

INSTRUCTORSHIP HITS \$1M

One of the biggest impacts Northampton School for Girls alumnae make is through the philanthropic support of the Northampton School for Girls Instructorship.

Established in 1999 by dedicated alumnae, Northampton School for Girls Instructorship is designed to focus on the education of young women at Williston, and to make sure that commitment remains part of the fabric of the two merged schools. This spring, the evolution of the Instructorship hit another milestone as fundraising efforts have increased the Instructorship fund to more than \$1 million in outright gifts and pledges, with an additional commitment of \$259,000 from documented bequests.

Combined together, the fundraising efforts have turned the Instructorship into one of the largest endowed funds for faculty support at Williston Northampton.

The Instructorship is handed out every three years. Most recently, the Instructorship was bestowed on Middle School teacher Jessica Rohan. During Convocation of this past year, Rohan's credentials for the Instructorship were laid out plainly: "to be called as a true middle school educator is to take up the mantle of preadolescence, to tackle the chemical tumult of pre-teens, and to share in the pivotal transition into high school. This too requires a seriousness of purpose. Our honoree for the 2024 Northampton School for Girls Instructorship is possessing of these qualities."


While the school encouraged past winners to find and don their White Blazers, there is a special honor for all winners to take
